Guidance on tourism and recreational activities in Natura 2000

- Objective: Updating partially outdated 2001 guidance document 'Sustainable tourism and Natura 2000 - Guidelines, initiatives and good practices in Europe' [link]
- Target audience: Primarily, the development and planning authorities at local and regional level
- Format: European Commission Staff Working Document (SWD) with main elements to consider in the planning and management of tourism and recreational activities in Natura 2000
- Collecting best practices on good cooperation between Natura 2000 authorities and the tourism sector

Main updates

The document builds on existing guidance and various (unpublished) background studies prepared for the European Commission until 2019:

- More guidance on mutual benefits of integrated approaches
- Update existing guidance on:
 - Pressures, threats and impacts
 - Management planning, streamlining it with existing guidance
 - Funding opportunities, both public and private
 - Use of the Natura 2000 logo on goods and services
- Support all sections with best-practice case studies from different MS



Preliminary table of content

- 1. Introduction
- 2. Natura 2000, characteristics and requirements including environmental pressures overview and key requirements from Article 6 of the Habitats Directive
- 3. Planning and managing tourism and recreational activities in Natura 2000
 - a. Identifying tourism pressures and threats
 - b. Determining the site's Tourism Carrying Capacity (TCC)
 - c. Planning management management measures and monitoring activities
 - Communication and outreach education and awareness-raising, marketing and stakeholder engagement.
