



Introduction


- Adopted on July 4, 2007






The 2007 Mid-term Review


No need for a fundamental change of policy

 - * Climate change




Overall Strategy

- Incorporate National policy dimensions in EU level initiatives




Agenda 2007-2009: Ongoing Initiatives
