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The revision of common safety method (CSM)



 Railway undertakings can operate only if they are certified.



 The certification criteria are defined in the CSM for conformity assessment.



 The 4th Railway package introduced the need to revise the CSM to address human factor and safety culture.



Transposing the safety directive



- Some new elements are included in the revised CSM:
 - Definitions of human factor and safety culture
 - The need for appropriate "human factor knowledge"
- Lack of clarity on how to apply those provisions create legal uncertainty for RUs safety certification, especially when supervised by several NSAs.

CER proposals



- Harmonisation of all national supervision regime and all certification will require time:
 - During this time, RUs shall not be negatively impacted.
 - A success condition is to achieve precise and concrete criteria in the CSM.
 - Another is to develop guidance for certification and supervision, to be harmoniously applied by ERA and the different NSAs.
- A CSM Annex should therefore define more precise criteria for human factor and safety culture.
- CER proposal to ETF: build common understanding on risks and opportunities in order to reach a joint position
- The CSM revision is an opportunity to find a common approach on important staff-related aspects
