Eurosite – Born from Twinnings



- Mid 1980s Conservatoire du littoral and Espaces Naturel Regional Nord-Pas-de-Calais – exchange of information between Northern France, United Kingdom and the Netherlands.
- **1987** the European Natural Sites Twinning Programme 33 sites across Europe.
- **1989** Eurosite established.
- **2015** Twinning between Staatsbosbeheer and the Biosphere Reserve Niedersächsische Elbtalaue, Germany.



How does a Eurosite Twinning work?



- 1. Internal discussions within an organisation
- 2. Initial contact with Eurosite
- 3. Initial contact with suitable site (or sites) identified
- 1. Draft a Twinning Agreement
- 2. Official launch event sign Twinning Agreement
- 3. Implement the Twinning
- 4. Monitor and review

- Realise mutually beneficial objectives
- Assure the quality of nature conservation practices and methods
- Acquire new skills, experience, knowledge and information
- Promotion to an international audience
- European dimension

Eurosite Twinnings do not involve:

- Complicated or time-consuming bureaucracy


